Annual Giving:

Tom Hoster and his University support team including Traslyn Butler, Marybeth Regan and his dedicated classmate

team have produced an amazing result: total dollars of \$7,575,072 participation rate of 74.3. This represents the 24th year in a row that the Class of 72 has been above magical 60%.

The effort is not magical. It is the result of unparalleled consistent and personal effort. This effort is unique to Tom's vision and energy. TIGER! TIGER!

50th Reunion Class Book:

The book and Class survey have been seriously affected by the supply chain problems that general publishing has experienced over the last 2 years. Though masterfully edited and completed by Ed Strauss and Merc Morris the actual printing and distribution has been markedly delayed. At present we are hoping for distribution in the early fall of 2022.

Special Program Initiatives:

Scholars and Memorial Scholarship Fund

Ron Brown, ably Chairs the Class of 72 Selection Committee which includes eight voting Class members. The fund now has market value of \$2,000,000 that allows grants totaling \$76,887 awarded to 5 scholars in FY22:

Kara Steele '21, Andrew Paul '22, Amelia Liu '23, Scott Bandura '24 and Ellen Toberman '25.

These Scholars of '72 have been ever present friends and partners with our Class. At the request of Ron Brown 23 of the 28 scholars forwarded personal updates for recent inclusion in the 50th reunion record. The 72 Class Scholars have demonstrated the

highest level of engagement in all activities at the University. We proudly note that 2 of our 28 scholars have been awarded the Pyne Prize for exceptional academic performance.

Civic Engagement

This Program was instituted in 2017 to allow undergraduate Princetonians to make a difference at home or abroad. The '72 Civic Engagement Fund has awarded 27 internships since inception through partnership with Princeton's Internships in Civic Service and Princeton's International Internship Program.

Interns receive \$ 5000-7000 support dependent on the length of Internship and the cost structure.

2022 opportunities: Greenwood Rising supporting immigrant and working-class communities in Elizabeth, NJ, Danish Institute of Human Rights, and International Institute for Democracy and Electoral Assistance in Sweden.

The Program also identified our 50th Reunion Community Service Project "Promoting Childhood Literacy Through Reading" encouraging classmates to contribute books or donations to Bridge of Books Foundation

The leadership of Grif Johnson, Barbara Julius and Helene Fromm has been notable for their enthusiasm and personal commitment.

Teaching initiative Class of 1972

The Endowment Fund for Initiatives in Undergraduate Education was funded after the 25th Reunion with \$256,000. It has now achieved a market value of \$1,364, 901. Allowing payout of \$50,994 in FY22, with an anticipated payout of \$53,034 for FY2023. We have now supported 25 courses over the life of the fund, generally supporting two courses per year

This year we supported an interdisciplinary course entitled "The Future of Reading" taught by Professor Rentzou in the French and Italian Department. The course investigates the ways in which we read now and in the future along with cultural social and cognitive ramifications of reading habits.

A second supported course was taught by Professor Stellato of the School of Engineering and Applied Science Operations Research and Financial Engineering: "Decision-making in the Age of Computers" decision-making with modern computing technologies ... with applications in data science, supply chain finance, transportation and robotics.

The Teaching Initiative has been lead under the wise stewardship of both Skip Rankin and Robert 'Bob' Wright over 25 years.

Women of '72

Daryl English and Janet Howard co-edited an inclusive piece on the story of the Women of 1972 for the Reunion Class Book. Daryl's diligent energy is building out a personal and collective story around the Women of our Class that will enjoy review and reflection when fully available. Daryl shares that the University Archivist has particular interest in the collective project. This has proved an invaluable addition to the history of our Class and the greater University.
